The Courage to Lead

We know their work. *The Leadership Challenge*, *A Leader’s Legacy*, *Encourage the Heart*, and *Credibility* have taught us much about great leadership. Just like many of us these gifted scholars came to leadership through teaching. Together we have walked a similar path and share common values. Noteworthy words about their journeys:

“Jim Kouzes has been thinking about leadership ever since he was one of only a dozen Eagle Scouts to be selected to serve in John F. Kennedy’s honor guard when Kennedy was inaugurated President of the United States. Kennedy’s inaugural call to action — ‘Ask not what your country can do for you; ask what you can do for your country.’ — inspired Jim to join the Peace Corps, and he taught school in Turkey for two years. What Difference? Kouzes and Posner remind us that the question great leaders ask themselves is not, “Will I make a difference?” Rather, the question is, “What difference will I make?” Critical difference! What difference will you make today for your students or organization?

All Leadership is Local! The leader who has the most impact on our day-to-day behavior is our immediate manager/leader and the informal leaders among us, not the CEO. Whether we stay or leave, commit to vision and values, treat others with appreciation and respect, take heart when challenges abound rests with the leaders closest to us. Formal manager or informal leader . . . leadership is local. Credibility is the foundation of that leadership, the second truth.

Incomprehensible and Conflicting Demands! We've got 'em! Our ultimate success as a leader depends on how well we know ourselves, what we value, and why we value it. "Values drive commitment," is Kouzes and Posner's third truth about leadership. Values are our critical guidance system . . . an essential internal GPS for post-secondary leaders who meet daily with many incomprehensible and conflicting demands.

Imagine Exciting Futures! Focusing on the future sets great leaders apart. "The capacity to imagine and articulate exciting future possibilities is a defining competence of leaders." Spend more time in the future! Lead a visioning session with your team, spend time reflecting on the future, read about the future, talk to others about the future, and listen to students as they share their hopeful futures. In the end, a forward-looking, positive leader is the only one who can make a positive difference.

Leadership is a Team Sport! You can't do it alone. We all need to work on our relationships. "Leadership is a relationship." High-quality relationships don't happen spontaneously. They require hard work, dedication, and leadership. Our role and responsibility as leaders is to promote connection, collaboration, confidence and competence. "Leadership is a shared responsibility. You need others and they need you. You're all in this together."

Trust Rules! Trust is the social glue that holds relationships, teams, and organizations together. "Trust rules your personal credibility. Trust rules your ability to get things done. Trust rules your team's cohesiveness. Trust rules your organization's innovativeness and performance."

Challenge is the Crucible for Greatness! Okay, enough about challenges making us stronger. How about a few "easy days"? The truth about great leadership is that "challenging times are a catalyst for revealing the truth about our leadership!" Challenges test us. As Jim Kouzes says, "Challenges introduce us to ourselves."

Go First! "You either lead by example or you don't lead at all," point out Kouzes and Posner. "Every leader we count as exemplary, models their values with their actions." 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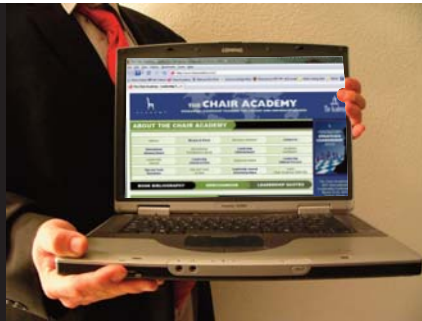
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
